### SAC Receives Grant Funds for Trail Maintenance

Sierra Access Coalition, along with partners Ironman Dual Sport, Paradise Ridge Riders, and Plumas Dirt Riders, received a RAC grant for single-track trail maintenance across the Plumas NF. The grant is for \$14,450, which will fund on-the-ground work on all motorized single-track trails on the Plumas NF next year. As a contribution to the grant funds, volunteers will monitor the trails throughout the 2013 season and report maintenance needs to SAC. A report will be written and submitted to the Forest Service with recommendations for the next year's maintenance.

We hope this is the beginning of a collaborative partnership between the user groups and the Forest Service. When we demonstrate that we are willing to help take care of the trails we use, we are hoping that the Forest Service will be more likely to designate additional routes for public use.

The RAC Committee funded one year of the two year grant request. However, Deputy Forest Supervisor Laurence Crabtree said he is fully supportive of this project and he will find money to fund it. So we are hoping this will become an annual effort on the part of the Forest Service and the user groups.

Bob Vancourt made an excellent project presentation before the RAC Committee. Bob will be coordinating volunteer workers next year.

Thank you Paradise Ridge Riders, Dave Wood, Plumas Dirt Riders, and SAC members for your help to get this grant, as well as your commitment to volunteer your time on this project.

The project will start in spring 2013. We will let you know more details in early spring.

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## How You Can Help Our Lawsuit

It is difficult to find the patience to wait to file the lawsuit, but as we wait for Butte County to join us, we are taking advantage of this time to document problems and issues related to motorized access to the Plumas NF. To this end, we need your help.

SAC is asking for your help to document any Forest Service unwillingness to work on access issues since the implementation of the Travel Management Plan in 2010. For example, SAC has continued to try to work with the Plumas NF on several issues:

- If you have been cited for a violation of the Travel Management Plan, we would like to hear from you. This year the Law Enforcement Officers are supposed to be “educating” the public about the new restrictions rather than writing citations. If you have been cited, please send us the location (road number or other description), the officer’s name, the date and time, and the details of the citation.
- The FS Schedule of Proposed Actions, which lists future projects, refers to road decommissioning and road closure projects as “Transportation Planning” or “Road Management” projects. So it is difficult for the public to identify projects that propose to close roads. Also the FS is proposing new regulations that will allow them to close roads with less public involvement.
- Last year the Forest Supervisor said advance notices of all proposed road decommissioning would be sent to SAC so the information could be sent out to members. To date, none have been sent to us, yet there are several ongoing projects with road decommissioning. They are not following through with the commitments they made.
- The FS made a commitment to SAC to do mixed-use studies, which would allow green sticker vehicles on 7 routes. Two of those routes (Bagley Pass and a portion of the Sloat-McRae Road) were made a lower maintenance level, which allows green sticker vehicle use. However, the other 5 routes were either denied or just simply disregarded. One of these routes is a major connection between Mt Hough District and Beckwourth District. After making the commitment to SAC, we were told there is no one on the Plumas NF who is trained to do mixed-use studies. This was not a good faith effort on their part.
- There are major mistakes on the Motor Vehicle Use Map such as:
  - \* Problems with access using the Four Trees Road through private property;
  - \* A large loop of over 10 miles of system roads south of Frenchman Lake has no right-of-way, which cuts off historically used roads which access approx. 7 square miles of public land;
  - \* Several other routes that don’t have legal right-of-way are shown, which leads the public onto private property..



By consciously leaving these routes on the Motor Vehicle Use Map, even after being informed of the problems, the Forest Service is encouraging trespass. However the FS is not willing to correct them until July 2013 at the earliest. And corrections are not being posted on the map on the USFS website. In the meantime, the public is at risk of being cited or confronted by private landowners.

- The FS vowed to schedule meetings with SAC to discuss items such as the major errors on the Motor Vehicle Use Map, but the FS never followed through to schedule these meetings as they promised.
- In April the FS promised to have a meeting with SAC to discuss future road closures on Feather River District. To date this meeting has not been scheduled and no one has contacted SAC.

There are numerous examples of the FS continuing their pattern of not working with SAC and other user groups, the public, and the counties.

If you know of additional problems, please let us know.

If you see errors on the Motor Vehicle Use Map, please let us know. This is very important.

## Idaho Wilderness Challenged

The Idaho State Snowmobile Association and Blue Ribbon Coalition have filed a lawsuit against the United States Forest Service, challenging the Clearwater National Forest's decision to impose restrictions on areas they have recommended for possible Wilderness classification.

The Clearwater NF recently issued a new Travel Plan limiting motorized and mountain bike access to designated trails and areas. Motorized vehicles and mountain bikes are prohibited uses in the 1964 Wilderness Act. However, these uses have previously been allowed in areas recommended for Wilderness designation unless they were proven to negatively affect future Wilderness qualification. The new Travel Plan changes that, imposing the same prohibitions on motorized and mechanized transport in areas the Forest considers Wilderness candidates, as are found in formal Wilderness, such as Idaho's Selway-Bitterroot and Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness areas.

## Crocker Campground Negotiations

The Crocker Campground in Clover Valley along the Beckwourth-Genesee Road is a favorite for OHVs. ([click here for a map](#)) However, there will soon be no legal access in and out of the campground for green sticker vehicles. The Travel Management Plan closed the road over to Lake Davis to green sticker vehicles, and the planned paving of the county road in Clover Valley will make that road illegal for OHV use. The project is funded by the Federal Highways Administration. SAC objected to this situation since OHVs have very limited camping options available to them.

SAC spent several weeks negotiating with the Forest Service, Plumas County, and Federal Highways Admin. We believe a solution has been found. The Forest Service has agreed to build an alternate OHV route out of the campground that will let green sticker vehicles (quads, motorcycles and side-by-sides) travel to the end of the pavement in Clover Valley, heading towards the Clover Valley Ranch and other points north. The trail can also be used by mountain bikes and equestrians.



The Forest Service has made it a priority to do the environmental analysis for the new route. If an agreement would not have been reached with SAC, the funding for the multi-million dollar paving project would have been at risk. So we are pleased that the project will move forward and that the Forest Service is working with the OHV community to preserve access to the few campgrounds that still allow access for OHVs.

## OHVs and Snowmobilers: Lake Davis Winter/Summer Recreation Proposal

The Forest Service has been seeking public input for the development of winter and summer motorized recreation in the Lake Davis area. To date there have been three public meetings. The last meeting was July 31. We have not received any updates since that meeting.

Local businesses have been very involved in the planning process, and the public should also voice their ideas and concerns. Supervisor Terry Swofford has been attending the public meetings and the Plumas County Coordination Council has been involved in the project planning process, as well as several user groups.

Two options for groomed snowmobile trails were developed in the first two public meetings. However, at the last public meeting on July 31 several Lake Davis residents wanted to see the winter portion of the project cancelled and leave the current snowmobiling situation as it is, without grooming and without restrictions in the meadows.

The Forest Service has not decided how to proceed with this project proposal. SAC hopes that as a minimum, they continue with the Summer Trails

portion. We will continue to work with the Forest Service to keep this project active and develop an improved system of roads and trails at Lake Davis for summer use.

We are have been working on mapping some trail systems and will be proposing connecting the Mt Hough trails (see the article below) with trails in the Lake Davis area to provide a continuous ride. Please send us your ideas and locations of trails you would like to see built or maintained.

## Mt. Hough/South Park Trails Proposal

The area known as "South Park", which is generally located between Chandler Road and the Cascades on Spanish Creek is being proposed as a non-motorized trail system to be set aside for bicycles, equestrians, and hikers.

In an effort to balance land uses, Ranger Mike Donald has agreed to create a new motorized trail system on Mt. Hough, from the railroad tracks above Chandler Road northwest, to Crystal Lake, Taylorsville, east to Grizzly Ridge and down Grizzly Ridge to Squirrel Creek. The trail system can be accessed from the Quincy side of Mt. Hough as well as from the Taylorsville side. The long-term vision for the trail system is to connect it to Lake Davis, which would be an incredible ride.

SAC has volunteered to flag in a new trail location on Grizzly Ridge for quads and motorcycles. We will be hiking and doing this flagging by



mid-October. If you are interested in helping, contact SAC.

The road that connects the Brady's Camp area to the Walker Mine area remains closed to green sticker vehicles. This was a critical part of the project which has been denied by the FS. SAC has been discussing this issue

with Ranger Mike Donald and it has yet to be resolved. SAC will be writing a letter to Deputy Forest Supervisor Laurence Crabtree asking for green-sticker vehicle use on this road.

On the positive side, many of the other trails that the public requested appear to have a good chance of being approved for use.



## New Mexico Travel Management Plan Appeal

### Jemez Springs and Acequia Coalition Join OHV Appeal against Forest Closures

Albuquerque, New Mexico - August 20, 2012 - The Village of Jemez Springs and the Jemez River Basin Coalition of Acequias have joined with the New Mexico Off Highway Vehicle Alliance (NMOHVA) in filing an appeal against the Santa Fe National Forest. The groups oppose the Travel Management Decision made by Forest Supervisor Marcia T. Garcia. The decision eliminates all public motorized use on more than 75% of the existing roads and trails in the Santa Fe National Forest. It also bans using a vehicle to retrieve game and vehicle camping on more than 99% of the Forest.

"Most people have no idea how much of the Forest is lost with this decision or how much it will affect them. For example, the decision bans ALL car-camping along Forest Road 376, even on the side of the road opposite the river. That's the most popular camping area in the whole Forest," said Mark Werkmeister for NMOHVA. "This isn't just about OHV's."

"The Village of Jemez Springs views the Travel Management closures as a drastic measure that we believe will have severe economic consequences for the Village," said Mayor Edmund Temple. "As the Village exists as an in-holding within the Santa Fe National Forest, these restrictions to the public's access to public lands pose a threat to the very existence of the Village. Fishermen, hunters, wood cutters, campers, families on day trips, and tourists from around the United States and the world are the life blood of the Village. The Village supports responsible and reasonable restrictions to protect the health of our national forests, but the Village believes these proposed regulations go far beyond that standard.

We are proud the Village and Acequia Coalition joined with us to oppose this decision," said Werkmeister. "We must all work together to protect everyone's right to use our public lands."

The Appeal will be decided by the Regional Forester's office in Albuquerque. The 45 day deadline for ruling on the Appeal is October 4th.

CORVA is very active in the political arena and contributes to a lobbyist in Sacramento. They work closely with the State Department of Parks and

Recreation, [Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation \(OHMVR\) Program](#) from the user's standpoint. They provide a valuable resource to land managers in the form of dedicated OHV enthusiasts who believe in responsible vehicular access.
