Snake Lake CG Improvements for OHV and Equestrians

Snake Lake Campground is being improved with additional campsites for OHV and Equestrians.

The Forest Service has added two additional campsites to the Snake Lake Campground for more OHV use. These are located at the previously used dispersed area down the road from the main campground. This site has been improved by adding two campsites with picnic tables and fire rings.

Also local horse clubs, with a RAC grant, have teamed up with the Mt Hough Ranger District to include an equestrian section behind the restrooms at the main campground. There will be corrals and a ramp to help disabled riders get onto their horses.

The Equestrian section should be completed in late fall. Thank you to Donnal Nichols, Diane Uchytil, and all the volunteers who are donating their time to this project. The Plumas National Forest road crew and fire crews are providing the clearing and earthwork at the site.

Snake Lake Campground is also being made more fire safe with the clearing of brush and removal of several trees as well as improvements to the loop road in the campground and an addition of a day use parking and picnic area. Come check it out.

Mt. Hough/South Park Trails Proposal

The public scoping period for the Mt Hough/South Park Trails is over.

The area known as "South Park", which is generally located between Chandler Road and the Cascades on Spanish Creek is being proposed as a non-motorized trail system to be set aside for bicycles, equestrians, and hikers. In exchange for this non-motorized area, Ranger Mike Donald has agreed to

create a new motorized trail system on Mt. Hough, from the railroad tracks above Chandler Road northwest, to Crystal Lake, Taylorsville, east to Grizzly Ridge and down Grizzly Ridge to Squirrel Creek. The trail system can be accessed from the Quincy side of Mt. Hough as well as from the Taylorsville side. The long-term vision for the trail system is to connect it to Lake Davis, which would be an incredible ride.

A RAC grant has been approved for some trail work this year. In addition, the Forest Service has already applied for another OHV grant to fund the remaining trail work next year, if the environmental analysis is completed and signed.

Snowmobiling at risk

The Winter Wildlands Alliance (WWA), a group based in Idaho dedicated to "human powered" winter recreation and strongly opposed to snowmobile use, recently failed to persuade the Forest Service to require snowmobiles be addressed in all



National Forest Travel Management Plans. Now they have filed suit against the Forest Service. They maintain that snowmobiles "must" be managed in every forest's Travel Management Plan.

This would result in Forest Travel Plans across the country being rewritten and rehashed out, and in our current political climate it's likely that the end result will be additional net loss of snowmobile acreage in many forests. If this precedence is established in Idaho it will likely affect snowmobilers nationwide.

OHVers and Snowmobilers: Lake Davis Winter/Summer Recreation Proposal

The Forest Service is seeking public input for the development of winter and summer recreation in the Lake Davis area. To date there have been two public meetings. SAC is meeting with the Forest Service next week to discuss more details of the proposal.

Local businesses are very involved in the planning process, and the public should also voice their ideas and concerns. Supervisor Terry Swofford has been attending public meetings and the Plumas County Coordination Council is becoming involved in the project planning.

Two options for groomed snowmobile

trails have been developed. The Forest Service Preferred Alternative is to groom from Hwy 70 up Jackson Creek (near Cromberg), which is southern exposure and doesn't have deep snow through the season. The public's preference is to build a grooming shed at Lake Davis and groom around the lake, north over Bagley Pass, and also down to the lower elevations of Chalet View Lodge and Jackson Creek, as snow conditions permit. The FS is not very supportive of grooming around the lake due to three pairs of bald eagles who nest there in the winter.

Concurrently, there is also a plan being

developed for summer use in the Lake Davis/Jackson Creek area. SAC is also asking the public to propose summer routes, whether motorized or non-motorized, for the area.

SAC is currently working on mapping some trails systems and will be proposing connecting the Mt Hough trails (see the article on page 2) with trails in the Lake Davis area to provide a continuous ride. Please send us your ideas and locations of trails you would like to see built or maintained for

CORVA is a varied group of outdoor recreationists who are extremely active in promoting the positive aspects of vehicular access on public lands and protecting that right.

CORVA is composed of many owners of street legal and "Green Sticker" vehicles such as ATV's, motorcycles, 3-wheelers, trail bikes, and dune buggies, as well as 4X4 vehicles, dual sport motorcycles, bajas, and desert racers. Plus many

others that use access for; hunting, rockhounding, bird watching, fishing and others activities.



CORVA's main purpose is to work with the land managers for responsible offhighway vehicular access and recreation opportunities. Secondarily, they educate their membership on the constantly changing rules and regulations and promote clean-up and trail maintenance projects.

CORVA is very active in the political arena and contributes to a lobbyist in Sacramento. They work closely with the State Department of Parks and Recreation, Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) Program from the user's

standpoint. They provide a valuable resource to land managers in the form of dedicated OHV enthusiasts who believe in responsible vehicular access.

CORVA is active at all levels of the land management public process with both the BLM and the USFS. They do this by commenting on environmental documents on as many issues as possible and maintaining close relationships with personnel in the field as well as the staff.

They coordinate with other multiple use organizations ranging from snow-mobiles to horse enthusiasts to protect multiple use rights from the environmental extremists. CORVA is "dedicated to protecting our lands for the people, not from the people."

Wallowa-Whitman NF Withdraws Travel Management Plan Decision
